Mentoring

ISWE launched its 2025 Mentorship Programme on January 20th at the Central Bank of Ireland. The event brought together this year's participants alongside returning mentors and mentees from the 2024 programme for a networking lunch. Deputy Governors Vasileios Madouros and Mary-Elizabeth McMunn addressed the gathering, demonstrating the Bank's continued support for this initiative.

Building on last year's success, the programme has grown to include 39 mentor-mentee matches. We have expanded our criteria to welcome early-stage PhD candidates and students from selected master's programmes, while also broadening institutional representation through increased private sector mentor participation.

The strong response to the 2025 programme highlights our economics community's commitment to nurturing the next generation of economists. We are grateful to all the experienced economists who have volunteered as mentors, and especially thank the Central Bank of Ireland for hosting the launch event and their ongoing support.

This expansion marks another step forward in ISWE's mission to support and advance women in economics, and we look forward to seeing these mentoring relationships flourish.

School Outreach

ISWE, in conjunction with UCD School of Economics, are piloting a workshop programme in which undergraduate students will visit transition year students in secondary schools to talk about their experience of studying economics. The workshops will give secondary school students an insight into studying economics and will introduce them to the diverse and interesting career paths that economics can provide.

The first cohort of 25 undergraduate students – our student champions – have now been trained, many of whom will deliver workshops at schools in the Dublin area during March and April. This initiative has been supported by The Business Studies Teachers' Association of Ireland (BSTAI).

The event consisted of a panel discussion, moderated by Prof. Orla Doyle (UCD), with panellists Dr. Tara Mitchell (TCD), Dr. Dora Tuda (ESRI) and Dr. Enda Hargaden (UCD). Panellists provided a critical assessment of 2025 Budgets, followed by a lively Q&A session.

Trip to Asia

As part of the seventh global St Brigid's Day programme, Ireland's Embassies and Consulates hosted and supported a range of events to celebrate the achievements of women. ISWE Chair Emma Howard was invited by the Consul General for the Consulate General of Ireland to Hong Kong and Macao Jennifer Bourke, and her excellency Ambassador Sarah McGrath, Irish Ambassador to Singapore for their St. Brigid's Day celebrations.

In Hong Kong, Emma gave a presentation on 'Gender Equality and Women in Economics' followed by a fireside chat with Stefanie Evennett, Managing Director of the Asia Board Director Programme at the Financial Times. The second event, in association with the Irish Chamber of Commerce (Hong Kong), was a presentation on 'The Irish Economy', followed by Q&A.

In Singapore, with the Ambassador and delegates from the Irish Embassy, Emma visited Raffles Girls' School to give a talk to girls from schools across Singapore on 'How economics can help us achieve the Sustainable Development Goals', followed by a reception and tour of the school. She also gave a talk at the Embassy, in collaboration with the Irish Chamber of Commerce, Singapore, on 'The importance of diversity in addressing global economic challenges'. Finally, she spoke to Michelle Martin on the 'Influence' segment of her radio show on MONEY FM 89.3.
